On January 8, I volunteered to be a inside door monitor for the MTNA Eastern Division Competitions at the College of Fines Arts at Boston University. Vermont was represented by Henry Wu (teacher Paul Orgel) in the Junior Performance Piano category and Thomas Bergeron (teacher Alan Parsley) in the Senior Performance Brass category. Tommy played the French horn. Tommy was awarded the first alternate meaning that he will perform in the MTNA national competition in Baltimore should the winner be unable to do so.

Fall Convention Recap

The fall 2016 State conference was held on October 22, 2016 at the Richmond Free Library. The speaker for the event was Gilles Comeau. Dr. Comeau is a member of the Faculty of Graduate studies and the director of the Piano Pedagogy Research Laboratory at the University of Ottawa. He has a cross appointment in Human Kinectics in the school of Health Sciences as well. There were 16 attendees from VMTA and Maine MTA.

The general convention topic was as follows:

"Scientific research and brain studies: What do they have to do with music teaching and music reading?"

The presentation of very current research from the University of Ottawa Piano Pedagogy Lab was organized into four general topics.

Motivation: how can we address the large drop-out rate?

Predictors of drop out, parental concerns, cultural differences in work ethic

Learning by ear: is there supporting evidence?

Scientific support, playing by ear and reading proficiency, teaching implications

Piano method books and the introduction of musical notation

Introduction of musical symbols, sequencing and reinforcement in methods

This topic included research in eye tracking on the page. Fascinating!

Learning music: myths and reality

Brain plasticity and building brain circuits, sensitive age periods, cognitive benefits of music training

The concluding discussion was a strong and clear advocacy for the study of music for the sake of music and its emotional benefits, not for the contribution to the development of other skills that we often use as a reason for music study.

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Competitive Auditions

The 2016 VMTA competitive auditions, facilitated by Claire Black, were held at the Richmond Free Library on November 13th. There were four entrants in three categories:

Junior Piano category Miriam Viazmenski, student of Victoria Dobrushina Henry Wu, student of Paul Orgel Senior Brass category Tommy Bergeron, student of Alan Parshley Senior Composition category Tracy Ferguson, student of Nancy Osborne

The adjudicator for the pianists was Su long Wong; for brass, Joy Worland; and for composition, Damon Ferrante. The judges offered written comments on the students' work, and Ms. Wong selected the winner and runner up for the piano division. Henry Wu won the state piano division, and Miriam Viazmenski was selected as Alternate. Tommy Bergeron and Tracy Ferguson were named State Representatives for their categories, per the procedure for divisions with only one entrant. In January, Henry Wu and **Tommy Bergeron** proceeded to the Eastern division competitions held in Boston, where Tommy was selected as the Alternate to the winner.





Spring Festival 2017

The VMTA Spring Music Festival is scheduled for Saturday, March 25, 2017 in the McCarthy Arts Center at St. Michael's College in Colchester. Keyboard auditions will use a recital format, with each open audition block having a rotating panel of two judges. Recital format with one judge will be used for non-keyboard auditions.

All students will have open auditions scheduled in one-hour "audition" time blocks. The students should plan to check in with the monitor 10 minutes before the scheduled audition block is to begin, and they are expected to stay through the one hour audition block in which they are scheduled. Because of scheduling challenges, teachers should not count on being able to hear their students perform.

VMTA SPRING FESTIVAL AUDITION RULES

- 1. Students entered in levels I and II shall perform a program of 2 or 3 pieces that are contrasting in mood, style, or tempo. At these levels (I and II) each individual piece or movement counts as one item, with no restrictions as to number of composers or periods. Students entered in levels III and IV shall perform a program of 2 or 3 Program Items, each item representing a di erent historical period and style from the other(s). At these levels, the student and teacher may Combine shorter pieces or movements from a work by the Same Composer into One program item. e time limit for the overall program still applies regardless of the number of pieces within the program items. No arrangements of any kind are allowed.
- No repeats shall be taken in long intermediate/advanced level works (i.e. sonata allegro form). Repeats may be performed in short elementary level pieces or when di ering 1st and 2nd endings are important to the structure of the piece.
- 3. All programs *must adhere* to the *stated time limits*. Please allow time for a brief pause between pieces.
- 4. The student must provide the judges with a copy of the music. No Photocopies are allowed.
- 5. For pianists, all pieces must be memorized. For instrumentalists, it is suggested that one piece be memorized.
- 6. For keyboard students, no simplified arrangements of original piano works by Baroque, Classical, Romantic, or Contemporary composers are permitted. Arrangements of folk/traditional songs are acceptable for levels I and II. Original repertoire is encouraged for all students. For instrumentalists, the use of arrangements is at the discretion of the teacher.
- 7. Instrumentalists must provide their own accompanists.
- Repertoire for pianists is limited to solo works (no ensemble pieces). All
 auditions are conducted in an *open recital* format where students play for an
 audience of parents and other students in addition to the judges.
- 9. Only students of member teachers may participate.

- 10. The student must have studied with his/her teacher for at least 6 months.
- 11. All students in keyboard auditions levels III and IV are advised to number the first measure of each line in their music. Other students may also wish to enter measure numbers in their scores.

If you are sending students to the auditions, it is required that you volunteer your time to judge or monitor. To make the Spring Festival a success, we must have high teacher participation! For every 2 students entered, a teacher should volunteer 1 hour. The *Guidelines* sheet for monitors will be sent to you by email when you register. Teachers not sending students are highly encouraged to volunteer as judges or monitors. Please email Lilly to volunteer.

To expedite the enormous task of scheduling please observe the February 24th deadline.

Monster Concert 2017

On January 21, the BBVMTA presented its 12th Biennial Monster Concert at Essex High School. 130 piano students participated by playing duets, trios, and two piano / eight-hand music on six pianos simultaneously. Students learned their music with their individual teacher and rehearsed for the first time as a group on Friday, January 20. A second rehearsal was held Saturday, January 21, with a concert of all ensembles held at 4:30 that afternoon.

As well as learning to follow a conductor, this ensemble experience helped the students improve continuity in rhythm and reading while having fun. For some, this was the first time being led by a conductor. Ginger Yang Hwalek returned for her eighth appearance as the conductor of the BBVMTA Monster Concert.

New this year was a flute ensemble directed by Laurel Ann Maurer. Ten flute students performed, accompanied by Sam Whitesell.

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Monster Concert Dedication

The teachers of the BBVMTA dedicated the monster concert to the memory of Dale Howe. Dale was a big supporter of the VMTA and was involved with the Monster Concert since 1996 by providing pianos for the students to play. The teachers, students and families of Chittenden County have appreciated his support.

Dale Howe was born April 4, 1941 in Randolph, VT. He grew up on the Howe dairy farms in Tunbridge, and graduated from South Royalton High School. Although he grew up baling hay, he spent his free time playing music. In 1964, he received his degree in Agriculture Economics from the University of Vermont yet chose to pursue his lifelong love of music when he attended the North Bennett Street School in Boston and received a certificate of Piano Technology. Dale began tuning pianos for Frederick Johnson Pianos in 1965 and later became a partner in the business. As President and co-owner he enjoyed the business of piano sales and service as well as interacting with musicians and customers, many of whom he had maintained a long term relationship. As a concert tuner he was proud to provide a Steinway Concert Grand Piano and tune it for many big name performers throughout Northern New England, including popular artists such as Count Basie, Ella Fitzgerald, Ray Charles and Dolly Parton. In addition to tuning, Dale played the piano and performed in various venues. He also took pleasure in playing for family, friends and customers. As a talented musician, he could play a variety of instruments. While piano was his main instrument he also enjoyed playing his saxophones in several big bands, most recently the Moonlighters of Hartland. As an avid collector of music memorabilia, he has amassed an impressive collection of old sheet music, books, and autographed programs and posters. Dale was a Shareholder and past Director of the Tunbridge World's Fair where he most recently was Stage Manager and on the Entertainment Committee.



Dale died October 18, 2016 at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center with his wife Nancy and daughters Julie and Melissa by his side. Dale is survived by his wife Nancy, of 50 years, his daughters Julie Howe of New York City and Melissa Pitts,

her husband Jeff and their sons Alex and Ryan of Nazareth, PA. He is also survived by: his sister Karen Davies (Fred Krhut) of Fairhope, AL; his brother Timothy James Howe (Linda) of Williston, VT; as well as aunts, an uncle, and many cousins, nieces and nephews. His love of family, both immediate and extended, was always a great source of joy and pride to him. Services were held on Saturday, November 5 at the Tunbridge Church.
