



Quad State Convention 2013



The Maine Music Teacher Association hosted the Quad State Convention at the University of Southern Maine on October 5, 2013. Vermont had a strong representation. The Brain And Music was the topic for the conference this year.

Rat the University of Texas, Austin. He directs the Psychology of Learning program at Colburn Conservatory of Music in Los Angeles. He is the most recent recipient of the MTNA Frances Clark Keyboard Pedagogy Award. His talk was titled, Beautiful. He spoke about reasons that formal education often fails to make lasting changes in how learners think and behave. As teachers, we must have a vision of our students as accomplished



learners and understand that the goal is "expressive inflection". Duke encouraged our allegiance to "elegance and simplicity" in our studios. Start the lesson with engaging questions, "what do you want to say with this music?" Set up something that the student is capable of in the first 15 minutes. Our job as the teacher is to then take the hardest thing away (such as in T-ball) and create a positive environment for the student to express emotion. Duke shared several you-tube videos of the youngest children expressing strong emotions in music and movement. He asks that as educators we should understand that children get this! We teach excellent position, note accuracy, and rhythms and fail to support the student in making an emotional connection to the music and the instrument. He urges us to "undo" what often is taught in formal education settings and support musical intentions with a strong vision of our students as accomplished musicians, knowing how we want to see the student at the end of the experience. By changing the expectations of our teaching we can affect changes in learning and behavior that are lasting. "Teach as if BEAUTY matters!"

Duke's most recent book, <u>Intelligent Music Teaching: Core Principles of Effective Instruction</u> is available at Amazon. He has numerous talks on the web and a great presentation on Cornell Cast.



Alan Wittenberg was the second speaker. Alan is a Certified Music Therapist. He is a pioneer in the field of Music Therapy and has implemented innovative programs in Japan, Russia, France, and Maine. His mission "is to bring the power and beauty of music to those who have little access to it in Maine". He describes this therapy work as "play therapy with sound", noting several examples from the Nordoff Robbins Program at NYU. He works with energy and emotion with those who are often without spoken communication and may be troubled working

in structured environments. His examples of numerous vocalizations from non-verbal clients were quite remarkable working by scaffolding from the need and ability at hand. His work is clinical yet his intentions are similar to Duke's. He notes "we all want to be heard. What is it that you are trying to do? Let me help you."

Diane Huling: Vermont's Commissioned Composer

VMTA members who attended the QUAD State convention were privileged to hear the premier performance of **Three Songs** performed by Diane Huling and Harold Holden. The three movements are as follows:

The Beggar's Lot End of Day La Pastora Fidi

Diane Huling, Vermont's 2013 Commissioned Composer, has an interesting musical background. Let's read about it in the following interview with Marie Johnson.



WHAT IS THE FIRST MUSICAL EXPERIENCE YOU REMEMBER?

My first musical experience was around age 3. My mother was a piano and trumpet teacher and would have recitals for her students. Instead of the usual nerve-wracking formal recitals, she would have little skits and dances and "fun" songs for them. I remember being on stage for a musical number of some old-fashioned song while somebody played the trumpet. I also remember lifting my skirt to the audience! - a real grand-stander, even then! Of course, it wasn't my "own" musical performance, but my life even at that age was filled with music. Since my brothers and sisters and parents all played instruments, we had quite a few different musical ensembles within the family, including a little Dixie-land band.

Tell us about your musical background.

I played piano and we had a clarinet, a trumpet, a trombone, and I think a French horn. My mother arranged the music for us and my father often helped us with the musical "interpretation." At one point, he went in another room while we were rehearsing, after telling us that we "needed to be ready for anything" if we were going to perform, and he started throwing pots and pans around, making as much noise as possible. We were supposed to keep playing, of course.

I began lessons with my mother at age 6 and outgrew her piano expertise around age 10. She found a Polish pianist in our town, a wonderful woman who had survived the concentration camps in World War II. She was inspiring and encouraged me to play Chopin; she gave me a book for my birthday with a selection of Chopin pieces, including Polonaises, Mazurkas, Etudes, etc. She would play them for me, and then I would read them. My love for Chopin came from her. Tragically, having made it through WWII and having been reunited with her husband from whom she'd been separated, she was murdered. At age 12, I was blessed with another incredible teacher; Maria Luisa Faini, an Italian concert pianist who had moved to this country. She was a classicist and a fantastic technician and musician; I followed her to the Eastman School of Music and studied a total of eleven years with her. It is to her that I owe my piano technique. Of course, I went on to study with other people, including Dalton Baldwin, Leonard Shure, and in master classes with Malcolm Bilsson and Paul Badura-Skoda.

My performing career has been long, though not unbroken; I have played on three continents, all over Europe, in South America, over most of the eastern United States. I've given debuts with a violinist at Carnegie Hall, in the Purcell Room in London, in Paris. I've also coached and performed German Lieder for over 30 years - which was a wonderful background for my composition of the songs that I just wrote for the MTNA convention. Of course, I wasn't able to pursue a dedicated performance career because I was teaching full time as well; I became a professor at a state college in Vermont and taught piano, theory

and composition there. It was very demanding and I had little time to tour. But now that I'm retired, I have more time to perform; I give at least 25-30 concerts a year, including chamber music and concerto appearances. (I'll be playing with the Montpelier Chamber Orchestra again next fall - it's an orchestra that I helped found nearly twenty years ago.)

How did you meet Arthur Zorn?

I first met Arthur Zorn 35 years ago, although I didn't have a lot of musical contact with him until recently. He took over my church position at Bethany Church in Montpelier, VT and we've kept in touch; he sings with me at concerts there, I play solo recitals and accompany his choir for special church events. We have been artistic admirers of each other now for several years and when I was creating these songs, I asked if he'd sing them. The beauty of this was that I could write specifically for his voice - it was a dream!

Do you plan melody or harmony first when you compose and why?

As for my compositions, I write harmonies first; they're the "color." The harmonies offer a mood and a direction, which I sort out as I ponder the words. (Even if I'm writing piano music or chamber music, the colors, shading, and the building or easing of tensions come from the harmonies.) I suppose it's somewhat like colors to a painter. I'm an oil painter - strictly an amateur - and I am a bit obsessed with colors and shading; the color makes things dance and pull back or push forward. It isn't just about a hue; it's about movement. In my musical compositions, I start with that, and then of course think about the structural architecture, and then I think about the melody and how the voice moves and what the singer's range is, etc. To top it off, I think about the undulation of the words, their rhythms, and that further suggests the pitches of the melodies. Of course, this isn't something that is mechanical; it's organic and everything gets sorted out in bits and pieces. Composing began as a sort of exploratory project for me, but quickly became another very personal expression of my own.

What is one thing we'd be surprised to know about you?

As for a startling thing about me: I'm probably a very boring person! I love life and everything that surrounds me! I love Vermont because I am entrenched in exquisite beauty, nature, fascinating people, (my own) messy gardens, and of course, my barnyard animals. I have a goat, two geese and seven chickens. Sometimes I have to compete with the goose, who can drown out even a Liszt Hungarian Rhapsody! But the goat loves Chopin; I've seen him right outside my studio window, listening, with his eyes closed... Lastly, I'm married to a boat builder and we have many dreams of combining a nice long boat trip - round trip from Lake Champlain, down the Mississippi, into the Gulf and then back again along the eastern shore - with concerts along the way - I suppose that's a surprise!

WHAT DO YOU REMEMBER AS THE MOST EXCITING MUSICAL EXPERIENCE IN YOUR LIFE?

As for the most exciting musical experience - that's impossible to say, I think. I'm sure I could say that playing the Beethoven Kreutzer Sonata in Paris to a rapt audience is high on the list, or Carnegie Hall. Playing for elementary school students in South America on a piano that only had 55 working keys - and they weren't consecutive - was also a highlight of my life - all the students lined up afterward and kissed me! But really, each performance becomes a momentary rapture - when the audience suddenly gets so quiet that I know they're swept up in the music; there's a physical and energetic connection that happens that's magical; it's addictive. I find every performance more exciting than the last.
