Imagine 50 years ago in 1965 when VMTA was founded during the pre-digital age: no internet, no digital TV, no mobile phones or iPods, no laptops and no drones. Our President was Lyndon B. Johnson. The first US combat troops arrived in Vietnam. Rev Dr. Martin Luther King Johnson was arrested in Selma, AL during demonstrations against voter registration rules. The cost of a first class stamp was 5 cents. Winston Churchill, Nat King Cole and TS Eliot all died in 1965.

Imagine the premiere of *The Sound of Music* as an instant hit which is still popular today. The movie *Dr. Zhivago* was another favorite. *My Fair Lady* was the Academy Award for best picture. SYLVIA PARKER'S Quad State session features Béla Bartók. She has pictures and stories from his time in Vermont, just down the road from her house, as well as New York and Massachusetts. She will talk about his ground-breaking research on East European folk music. He collected peasant melodies from Hungary and neighboring countries that were all part of the great Austro-Hungarian Empire before World War I. He turned many of those peasant *JEWELS* into arrangements for piano and other instruments. Parker's session features the sounds of peasants singing and playing their violins, flutes, and bagpipes on his field recordings, his piano arrangements of those same melodies, and even his own performances of some of them. Parker will show his field notations and research documentations alongside scores of his piano arrangements. Young students from each of the four states at the Quad State meeting will perform pieces from Bartok's 150-plus piano arrangements.

SYLVIA PARKER is Senior Lecturer of Music at the University of Vermont, where she teaches piano and music theory. She performs frequently as piano soloist and ensemble player in Vermont, nationally and internationally. Her new CD entitled, *BÉLA BARTÓK: PEASANT JEWELS* is published by Centaur Records (2014) and includes his complete piano settings of authentic peasant melodies. Her journal publications about Bartók include *BÉLA BARTÓK'S OTHER MICROCOSMOS* in MTNA e-Journal (2014), *A RIVERTON RETREAT: ROYAL CHARTER TO STATE FOREST* in Vermont History (Winter/Spring 2010), *BÉLA BARTÓK'S ARAB MUSIC RESEARCH AND COMPOSITION* in *Studia Musicologica* (2008), and *BARTÓK AT THE CROSSROADS: A CLASSICAL SONATINA FROM FIVE RUMANIAN FOLK DANCES* in College Music Symposium (2003).

1:30-4:30 WELLNESS WORKSHOP. PRESENTER: DR NICHOLAS QUARRIER PT,DPT,OCS.

Why do so many musicians get hurt playing their instruments? What actually is tendonitis? How do we prevent these injuries? This 3-hour workshop will examine all of these issues. We will discuss how poor posture, muscle tension, and stress cause physical injuries. The topic of "tendonitis" will be reviewed: why some people have tendonitis for months and other for days, and how to take care of it/prevent it. There will also be an extensive discussion on how exercise relates to musician's health: should the musician lift weights and should the musicians stretch and what exercises are best.



The workshop is planned to discuss the causes of injury in the first half followed by a break and discussion/workshop in exercises for musicians (Exercise Pearls). Attendees are asked to bring their instruments, in that, as time permits demonstrations may be used to help understand the various topics.

Dr Quarrier is a Clinical Associate Professor in the Department of Physical Therapy at Ithaca College, Ithaca, NY. For over 25 years he has specialized in treating injured musicians. Dr Quarrier has published and lectured throughout the country about music-related injuries. He developed and taught The Healthy Musician Workshop in Ithaca for over 15 years. Pierre Jalbert (b. 1967) is one of the most highly regarded American composers of his generation, earning widespread notice for his richly colored and superbly crafted scores. Focusing primarily on instrumental works, Jalbert has developed a musical language that is engaging, expressive, and deeply personal. Among his many honors are the Rome Prize, the BBC Masterprize, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center's Stoeger Award, given biennially "in recognition of significant contributions to the chamber music repertory," and a 2010 American Academy of Arts and Letters award. Pierre grew up in northern Vermont and began piano lessons at the age of five, immersing himself in the classical repertoire. Jalbert is Professor of Composition and Theory at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music in Houston, where he has taught since 1996, and he serves as one of the artistic directors of Musiqa, a Houston-based contemporary chamber ensemble.

BÉLA BARTÓK: Peasant Jewels by Sylvia Parker

Sylvia Parker's new album of Béla Bartók's folk music reflects not only the deep musical abilities of the Berlin pianist, but her lifelong passion for the Hungarian composer who looked to his homeland for inspiration.

"Béla Bartók: Peasant Jewels," a two-disc set just released by Centaur, can be enjoyed in two ways: one, as a University of Vermont senior lecturer's compilation of Bartók's complete arrangements of folk melodies for piano, or as a concert pianist's sympathetic and excellent performances of intriguing and beautiful music.

For this critic, it was mostly the latter.

Bartók (1881-1945) loved the folk music of his native Hungary and it inspired his life's work. He collected thousands of peasant melodies from not only Hungary, but from sounding Eastern European regions. From these, he composed hundreds of arrangements for voices and various instruments. Of those, some 150 are for solo piano.

Bartók, a successful concert pianist, made them more palatable for audiences by spicing up the rhythms and harmonization. Parker includes a few of the absolutely charming field recordings of singers and instruments the pieces are based upon — and comparing the versions is simply fascinating.

According to Parker's excellent liner notes, Bartók wrote, "We must penetrate into ... the special character of a folk melody ... feel it, and bring it out in sharp contours by the appropriate setting. The composition round a folk melody ... must be a work of inspiration."

Parker, who has long taught piano and theory at UVM, has made a study of this composer who lived a summer in Riverton. Her performances of these short piano pieces capture Bartók's spirit, reflecting the varying character of these miniatures. The playing is fluid, with a light singing touch and rhythmic sensitivity

With beautiful articulation, Parker delivers the music's intimacy and simple profundity.

The first of the two CDs is "For Children" (BB 53), written in 1908-09, divided between Hungarian (42) and Slovak (43) melodies. Most are less than a minute; the longest is 1:47.

The Hungarian melodies sound a bit like nursery tunes with a slightly spicy, modal edge. Many sound familiar but with irregular rhythms. Some were written to be played by beginners, while others are more advanced. In fact, they seem to increase in complexity and difficulty progressively.

The Slovak melodies have a slightly different harmonic and rhythmic flavor, perhaps a bit less acerbic. Some are more complex, deeper, with that same sense of familiarity — with a twist.

There is no sameness in these 82 miniatures, only endless variety. Parker said this is the original version, not the revision published posthumously in 1947.

Disc 2 offers more variety, including works heard in the concert hall. The Six Romanian Folk Dances (BB 68) of

1915 are regular concert fare, though they are simply Bartók's arrangements of authentic folk melodies. Parker also included three of his 1932-39 "Mikrokosmos" (BB 105), eliminating those that were more the composer's work than the original.

The 15 Hungarian Peasant Songs (BB 79) of 1914-18 are certainly meant for the concert hall. They're very different — darker, modal, more complex, more strident, much bigger and more virtuosic. In much the same vein is the six-dance movement Petite Suite (BB 113) of 1936.

Contrasting that are two of the composer's 1908 10 Easy Piano Pieces. There are also 20 Romanian Christmas Carols (BB 65) of 1915, bearing no relationship to what Americans know. But they're folksy, charming, intriguing and very short — and some are quite complex rhythmically.


Parker has beautifully combined erudition and heartfelt performance in creating a window into the deeply authentic ethnic world of Béla Bartók.
