### **Spring Festival 2015**



The VMTA Spring Music Festival is scheduled for Saturday, April 4, 2015 in the McCarthy Arts Center at St. Michael's College in Colchester. Keyboard auditions will use a recital format, with each open audition block having a rotating panel of two judges. Recital format with one judge will be used for non-keyboard auditions.

All students will have open auditions scheduled in one-hour "audition" time blocks. The students should plan to check in with the monitor 10 minutes before the scheduled audition block is to begin, and they are expected to stay through the one hour audition block in which they are scheduled. Because of scheduling challenges, teachers should not count on being able to hear their students perform.

After completing the electronic registration form, you will mail your registration check to Lilly. Recital format with one judge will be used for all non-keyboard auditions. Non-keyboard repertoire is left to the discretion of the teacher. You will find sample programs on the next page.





### VMTA SPRING FESTIVAL AUDITION RULES

1. Students entered in levels I and II shall perform a program of 2 or 3 pieces that are contrasting in mood, style, or tempo. At these levels (I and II) each individual piece or movement counts as one item, with no restrictions as to number of composers or periods.

Students entered in levels III and IV shall perform a program of 2 or 3 Program Items, each item representing a different historical period and style from the other(s). At these levels, the student and teacher may Combine shorter pieces or movements from a work by the Same Composer into One program item. The time limit for the overall program still applies regardless of the number of pieces within the program items. No arrangements of any kind are allowed.

- 2. No repeats shall be taken in long intermediate/advanced level works (i.e. sonata allegro form). Repeats may be performed in short elementary level pieces or when differing 1st and 2nd endings are important to the structure of the piece.
- 3. All programs *must adhere* to the *stated time limits*. Please allow time for a brief pause between pieces.
- 4. The student must provide the judges with a copy of the music. *No Photocopies Are Allowed*.
- 5. For pianists, all pieces must be memorized. For instrumentalists, it is suggested that one piece be memorized.
- 6. For keyboard students, no simplified arrangements of original piano works by Baroque, Classical, Romantic, or Contemporary composers are permitted. Arrangements of folk/traditional songs are acceptable for levels I and II. Original repertoire is encouraged for all students. For instrumentalists, the use of arrangements is at the discretion of the teacher.
- 7. Instrumentalists must provide their own accompanists.
- 8. Repertoire for pianists is limited to solo works (no ensemble pieces). All auditions are conducted in an *open recital* format where students play for an audience of parents and other students in addition to the judges.
- 9. Only students of member teachers may participate.
- 10. The student must have studied with his/her teacher for at least 6 months.
- 11. All students in keyboard auditions levels III and IV are advised to number the first measure of each line in their music. Other students may also wish to enter measure numbers in their scores.

### STEPS TO ENROLL A STUDENT 2015 VMTA SPRING MUSIC FESTIVAL

### **ELECTRONIC ENROLLMENT**

To register, please email Lilly Ramsey at <a href="cldkramsey@comcast.net">cldkramsey@comcast.net</a>. Lilly will email you an Excel attachment to complete and return to her with teacher, student and performance information. After completing the electronic registration form, you will mail your registration check to Lilly. The deadline for registration and receipt of registration check is Friday, February 20, 2015 at 6 pm Your Registration Check Must Be Received In Order For Your Registration To Be Processed.

Please carefully read the rules, the levels and fees chart (see page 3), and the instructions that follow. Email Lilly Ramsey as soon as you know you will have students participating in Spring Festival to request the Excel attachment so that you have time to complete this Excel form and email it back.

Lilly Ramsey will do her best to accommodate teachers' request to hear their students' auditions but she cannot guarantee that the schedule will allow every teacher to hear all her entrants. Completing the registration process early and being flexible in the time and number of hours that you are available to judge helps this scheduling process. Also, entry fees cannot be refunded; therefore, teachers are advised to check with students/parents regarding conflicting activities for April 4th prior to registration deadline.

If you are sending students to the auditions, it is required that you volunteer your time to judge or monitor. To make the Spring Festival a success, we must have high teacher participation! For every 2 students entered, a teacher should volunteer 1 hour. The *Guidelines* sheet for monitors will be sent to you by email when you register.

Teachers not sending students are highly encouraged to volunteer as judges or monitors. Please email Lilly to volunteer.

To expedite the enormous task of scheduling please observe the February 20th deadline.

### VMTA Donor Program

Your VMTA Board has endorsed the new donor program again for 2015. Launched in 2013, the donor program was created to expand the base of VMTA supporters and increase revenue allowing our VMTA to become more financially stable and increase programs for students and members. Prior to 2013, VMTA had not asked for charitable contributions. Instead, VMTA solicits sponsors to advertise their businesses on our web site and in our newsletter. Presently, there are eleven sponsors adding \$1300 annually to our budget.

Each of our 54 VMTA members has committed parents who support the music education of their children. Many also work for businesses that would support our organization with charitable contributions and/or matching contributions. The donor program is different from the sponsorship programs because VMTA does not provide advertising in our publications or on our web site. Instead, donors will be listed in our fall and spring program publications. ### In Memoriam

### Lowell Trecartin

1957 - 2014

Lowell Trecartin, owner-operator of Green Mountain Piano Moving, and active supporter of the VMTA, died unexpectedly but peacefully at his home in West Danville on November 24, 2014. A service of remembrance for Lowell was held on December 1, 2014 in the Seventh Day Adventist Church in St. Johnsbury.

As owner-operator of Green Mountain Piano Moving based in South Barre, he developed a nationwide reputation for excellence and was considered the best in that niche market. Over the years, he has moved many pianos for VMTA.

Lowell was born in Iron Mountain, Michigan. He attended Seventh Day Adventist Church Academy and College, and was self-employed throughout his career owning cabinetry and plastering companies in Massachusetts. He loved canoeing and exploring in Canadian wilderness areas. In 2013, he fell in love with maple sugaring and had nearly finished work on a maple sugar house.

### Winter Piano Care

### TIPS TO HELP KEEP YOUR PIANO FROM CLUNKING

We all think about preparing ourselves for the winter. Winterizing our homes usually includes things like chimney sweeping, furnace maintenance, and window sealing. Before you put the checklist away, take some time to consider the negative effects the heating season can have on your piano.

When your piano technician comes for your semi-annual/annual tuning, you are probably used to hearing a lecture about the benefits of keeping your piano in a



steady climate. The more the climate fluctuates the more your piano's tuning will as well. When we turn on the heat the dry air will gradually suck the moisture out of the wood, changing the position of the soundboard and bridges, hence changing the tuning. When wood loses moisture other problems may crop up, too. You may notice extra noises when you play. Clicking sounds are sometimes caused by loose screws, loose hammer heads, loose key tops, or other broken glue joints. Too much moisture can also cause problems, so we need to be mindful about keeping our pianos in the comfort zone.

### What you can do for preventative maintenance:

- 1. Buy a hygrometer that has a "Min/Max" feature. This is a tool that helps you to measure the relative humidity (RH) in the room. According to the Dampp-Chaser Corporation, 42%RH is ideal. However, according to the National Environmental Systems Contractor's Association (NESCA), during the winter months, the highest "safe" indoor humidity when the outside temperature is 30 degrees is 35%RH. Keep the hygrometer on the piano's music desk or in an area near the piano so that you are getting an accurate reading of the cycle your piano is experiencing.
- 2. Do I NEED TO MOVE MY PIANO? If your piano is directly next to a heating source (or a window that will be open during the non-heating season) move your piano to a different location! I know that this is not always possible. Check with your piano technician if you have any doubts.
- 3. Turn down the heat. Run a humidifier? If you are able to control the heat by room, consider keeping the room with the piano at a lower temperature. If you decide to run a room humidifier, make sure that it is far enough away from the piano and that you follow the guidelines of the NESCA (mentioned under Heading 1.) If the humidifier is too close it can cause piano issues associated with too much moisture like rust and mold. Remember to check your hygrometer to monitor the room's moisture!
- 4. Consider a climate control system for your piano. The "Piano Life Saver" system by the Dampp-Chaser Corporation is an excellent product that will help to minimize your piano's climate cycle: <a href="https://www.pianolifesaver.com">www.pianolifesaver.com</a> If you already have one of these, please ask your piano technician to change the humidifier pads when they are there to tune.
- 5. Schedule an appointment for Tuning or Maintenance. It is a good idea to adhere to your regular tuning schedule. However, if your piano is making extra noise or if you're experiencing sticking keys, it may be time for some maintenance. If you don't already have someone taking care of your piano, find a *Registered Piano Technician* in your area at <a href="www.ptg.org">www.ptg.org</a>


